# Liquidation Program Profitable

Borough Spends \$42,990 to Bring in Revenue of \$184,287-Plus Increasing Tax Levy Each Year

CARTERET - This municipality's tax title liquidating program, once the subject of bitter political controversy, has been a most profitable undertaking. Initiated in June, 1942 the

program to date has cost a total of \$42,990.50 and has resulted in the sale by the Borough of municipal-owned land in an aggregate of \$184,287. These sales in addition to bringing cash into the treasury, have restored to taxation property on which taxes long had been delinquent and also on which, prior to the liquidation, it was necessary to pay taxes to the county. The property, therefore, while bringcosting money
