SOCIAL SECURITY

Questions and Answers

1 Q. Though we hope to have children, I plan to continue in my career after I get married. Since the children and I will be able to get Social Security benefits based on my husband's record if anything should happen, why should I bother to pay Social Security?

A. Because your husband's Social Security record won't pay you or the children anything unless something happens to him. If YOU became disabled or died, YOU'D have to be insured under Social Security for payments to be made to your children. For example, suppose you became too disabled to work after you'd been married 10 years. If you had 5 years Social Security work credit in the 10-year period before the date of your disability, and 1 1/2 years in the last 3, both you and the children would get monthly checks from your record.

2 Q. If I work after I marry, will I lose the Social Security credit I earned before I was married?

A. No. The Social Security credits you earn after you're married will be added to credits you earned before your marriage. That's why we don't change your Social Security number on our records after you're married, just your name.

Health Hints

SKIN SHOWS

It is sometimes a serious form of rash judgment for untrained people to make judgments concerning rashes. Nevertheless, doctors do not often see a skin eruption that has not first had, and failed to respond to, home treatment. Sometimes they have a job removing medications in order to get down to the affected skin. Occasionally, they have to deal with complications that spring from overtreatment by the patient. Not infrequently the initial condition was simple compared to the secondary skin eruptions produced by the patient through lack of knowledge and excess of zeal.

Skin is not an indestructible armor; it is a very specialized sensitive tissue. It cannot be abused without serious danger of producing inflammatory processes. Consequently some medical authorities say that the first step in the safe care of minor skin rashes and injuries is to collect all skin remedies in the house and destroy them. If — with simple, intelligent home care, and sufficient time for good results to follow — the conditions do not clear up, you should see your doctor. He is trained to recognize the significance of skin symptoms, which may indicate anything from an allergic reaction or fungus infection to a deep-seated disease. If you treat yourself, the cure may truly be worse than the disease.
