PERTH AMBOY — Contributing members of the Perth Amboy Area Community Chest will be called on next Wednesday to give consideration to proposed recommendations calling for drastic changes in the constitution of the Chest.

Meeting at 8 P. M. at the YMHA building on Madison Avenue in Perth Amboy, members will hear recommendations proposed by a committee, headed by former County Prosecutor, Matthew F. Melko, suggesting expansion of member agency service and campaign coverage to include 13 communities in the Raritan Bay area adjacent to Perth Amboy.

Board member representatives on each member agency and the Chest is provided for in the proposed changes in the constitution and provision is made for the organization of Social Planning Council to be composed of all voluntary health, welfare, educational and recreation agencies and departments of government in the 14 communities.

Campaign committees would be organized in each community and separate drives of the member agencies including the Raritan Council Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scout Council, Y.M.C.A., Y.M.H., Salvation Army, Kiddie Keep Well Camp, United Defense Fund (Incl.
