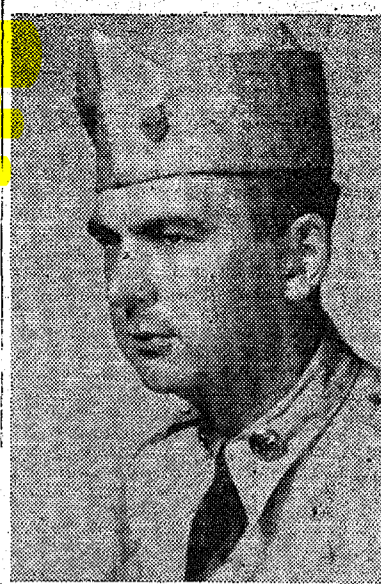
DOUBLE SORROW
